Just like playing a sport or playing an instrument, becoming a good reader takes practice, practice, practice. Building a community of independent readers is a challenge








Green-Fields Begins New STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) Program



To the casual observer, the Green-Fields media center continues to have the look and feel of a traditional library setting. There are stacks and shelves of books, a circulation desk, study tables and chairs, a separate reading area and a computer lab space for research. Students check out and return books on a weekly basis, teachers utilize the space for class projects and assessments, and it even serves as a go-to spot for indoor recess several times each year. It truly is a valuable, academic,

lesson activities that combine the use of science, technology, engineering, and math, students are challenged to think beyond just

the facts and tap into their creative, solution-oriented, collaborative selves. Many activities are "hands-on" and focus on working together to define, create or complete a task. Beyond this, children are encouraged to ask questions, imagine all of the possibilities without constraint, build and create, evaluate their work, share their results and reflect upon the process.

Students also have an opportunity to apply their knowledge through activities that address concepts which are a part of their daily world. Notions such as "How Am I Smart" teach children how they learn best and how they can use this knowledge in school. Computer and video game concepts are emphasized through coding activities. Structure design and construction are highlighted through bridge building, playground design and a showcase of student work. We've even planned for students to work with our WDHS Engineering Club to learn about robotics and computer programming.

Of course, what is mentioned above is just a small part of the overall curriculum. As our elementary students begin to navigate a 21st Century world, it's more important than ever to provide tools that will help them find their way in an ever-changing diverse, creative

and technical environment. We're excited and proud of the opportunity we've been given to promote higher-level thinking among our students while providing an enjoyable, yet rigorous venue to watch our students grow academically and socially through this new adventure.





WDMS Fifth Annual Eagle Launch



On Friday, September 21st, positive behavior took flight and soared at the West Deptford Middle School's Fifth Annual Eagle Launch. The school-wide event promoted the Middle School's Positive Behavior Support in Schools (PBSIS) program, which emphasizes 8 pillars: respect, gratitude, caring, responsibility, fairness, citizenship, trustworthiness and sportsmanship. To capture and reinforce these characteristics, the



students and staff at WDMS participated in an entire day's worth of exciting activities that reinforced the program's missions.

Students were engaged in a variety of events that align with the school's PBSIS mission. Such activities include three Character Education lessons facilitated by the teaching staff. Students received a presentation to reinforce the specifics of core values essential to our school mission and the ways in which staff members will reward students for putting these values into action. In addition, students worked on an activity called "Get in the Habit" to critically analyze their own habits and how those habits impact themselves and others. Students



were also provided with the opportunity to participate in two interactive activities that promote interdependence, working

promote interdependence, working cooperatively, positive communication and relationship building. The third lesson had students complete an activity from the book <u>Seven Habits of Highly Effective Teens</u> to promote student insight and ownership with the exercise, The Great Discovery. During this activity, the students created their




own personal mission statement.

In addition, all 900 students contributed to the creation of our new mural, "Step Into Your Dreams, They Know The Way", which is located outside our library. The

flowers in this year's mural were decorated with the fingerprints of each student. Furthermore, the students built on their teamwork and leadership abilities during the various station activities led by members of The West Deptford Police Department. Such activities included the Tarp Challenge, Rock Paper Scissor Hula-Hoop Race and Bull-Ring Challenge. Each activity set the tone and laid the foundation for exemplary character attributes among our students and staff.

A New School Year at WDHS Brings New Opportunities



Mark Wagner, author of the popular book, <u>MORE NOW: A Message from the Future for the Educators of Today</u>, writes to educators of today, "You are a pioneer, a founder, and an architect of what's possible" (17). Last spring, West Deptford High School had this very thought in mind when preparing its 2018-2019 school year schedule with new opportunities for students to help them plan their first steps towards the future.

One of the first learning opportunities we researched and implemented that will prepare today's students for tomorrow's world is our full-year course titled "Tomorrow's Teachers". The course is designed to introduce the beginning student to the field of education through a compilation of vignettes in which they discover the power of knowledge. Students openly discuss education in the 21st century and beyond, and the rewards and challenges experienced in education in our society. The course is divided into three units

of study, Experiencing Learning (helps students become better acquainted with themselves as individuals, learners, and community members, appreciate the diversity of others and examine the various stages of learning), Experiencing the Classroom (helps students become acquainted with personal and professional roles of educators), and Experiencing the Teaching Profession (helps students develop a greater understanding of the history of education in our state and nation, gain insights into the structure and functions of our school and school systems, reflect on the teaching profession and recognize the significance of teacher leadership and advocacy for

the profession). Knowing that there is a real and growing shortage of qualified educators in our schools, this course stands to inspire, recruit and prepare potential students to become teachers as they "experience education" throughout the curriculum. Students in this class have already covered major themes in education such as how to build self-worth and self-esteem in learners by completing "The Pot Not Watched" activity in which classmates filled each other's pots with positive affirmations. Students walked away from this activity realizing the importance of building these qualities within any learner so as to help them reach their greatest potential. Abigail Hicks, a senior in the class, says, "Tomorrow's Teachers really opened my eyes to the different levels of learning throughout the school. This class spreads so much good self-esteem and positivity towards everyone in it. I always enjoy going every day because I know I will always be uplifted in this class. We have many open discussions about big topics



regarding school during class which we don't usually talk about in other classes. I know this class will really have an effect on my future career and I suggest everyone take it even if you don't want to be a teacher in your future."

To help prepare our students for the ever-changing world of S.T.E.M. and Business and Marketing, West Deptford High School expanded its programs in these areas to compete with other high schools who have official academies. Now, due to our growing partnerships with local colleges such as Camden County College and Rowan College at Gloucester County, we are able to expand our offerings for students to earn college credits while still in high school. Students have the option to take dual credit courses, taught by a WDHS teacher for college credit, or to take RCGC classes on the college campus or online. Depending on the field of study each student chooses, he/she could walk out of high school with any number of college credits, ranging from 3 – 30 credits. For example, in S.T.E.M. related fields, students have the opportunity to take dual credit courses already offered at our HS (AP Biology, Anatomy & Physiology, AP Chemistry, AP Calculus, Exploring Engineering I and II) in addition to any other RCGC courses listed under our College Now Agreement. In the fields of Business and Marketing, we are proud to announce the addition of two new courses – Business Law and Introduction to Logistics – both of which would help students who want to pursue these areas of study either under our College Now Agreement or post-high school. Currently, WDHS has 19 students participating in this College Now option, 11 of which are taking college classes on campus in the afternoon a couple of days a week and 8 who are taking courses online. Our High School juniors and seniors have mentioned that they enjoy the college atmosphere and find no trouble fitting in with the older students on campus.

In addition to these "architectural changes" in our academic programming, West Deptford High School has also expanded its Work Release Program to include Senior Experience Placements for students in select fields of study. Out of 48 seniors enrolled in our Marketing Education and Work Release Program, 40 of those students already have been placed at jobs in the surrounding communities; job locations vary from Heritage's, WaWa, ShopRite, Nicolosi's Catering, Ciconte's, Kiva Printing, and our District's very own Young Eagles Program. Although this program is not new, we are at an all-time high for job placements this early in the year. The expansion of this program includes students who elected to take the independent study course titled Senior Experience. One senior, Christopher Cori, for example, is interested in the field of Sports Management and is currently interning with our HS Athletic Trainer in the training room to gain some "on the job" experience.

These are just a few of the upgrades West Deptford High School has made over the course of the past year, but we are not finished. Vincent Gray, a senior in "Tomorrow's Teachers", presented a powerful quote to his classmates about how the best educators not only demonstrate but also inspire. As a school staff and administration, this is our ultimate goal. We strive to continually improve and make these architectural changes in our programming and to remind ourselves that it is this forward-thinking work that helps to shape a better future for our students so that they, in turn, can impact others positively and powerfully.
